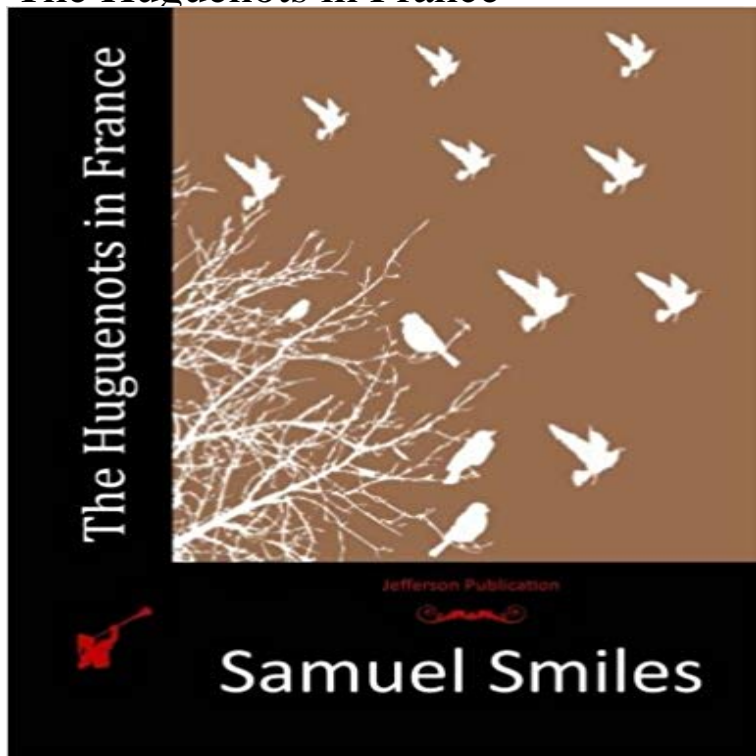


The Huguenots in France
