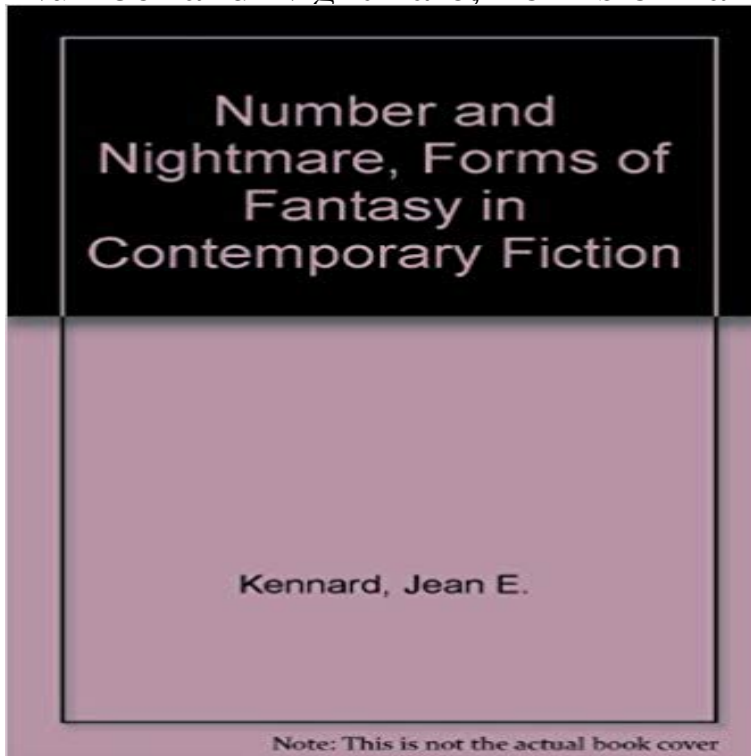


## Number and Nightmare, Forms of Fantasy in Contemporary Fiction

As these novelists go beyond the ideology expressed in the writings of Satre and Camus, the author examines the relation of each to his same past and the fantasy techniques each has created in response to the notion of the absurd dilemma. The novelists of number agree with the Existentialist premise that mans relationship to his universe is fundamentally absurd; that it is anti-literature, anti-myth destructive of form. The novel of number takes the reader systematically and logically toward nothing, toward the void, by breaking down one by one his expectations of realism. On the other hand, the novelists of nightmare respond by believing that the world has order even if man cannot discover its meaning and even if it does not contribute to his happiness, and is a constructive form. Each of these writers creates myths, and move the reader towards recognition of an all-inclusive world, a puzzle in which all pieces fit. from the jacket flap.

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
